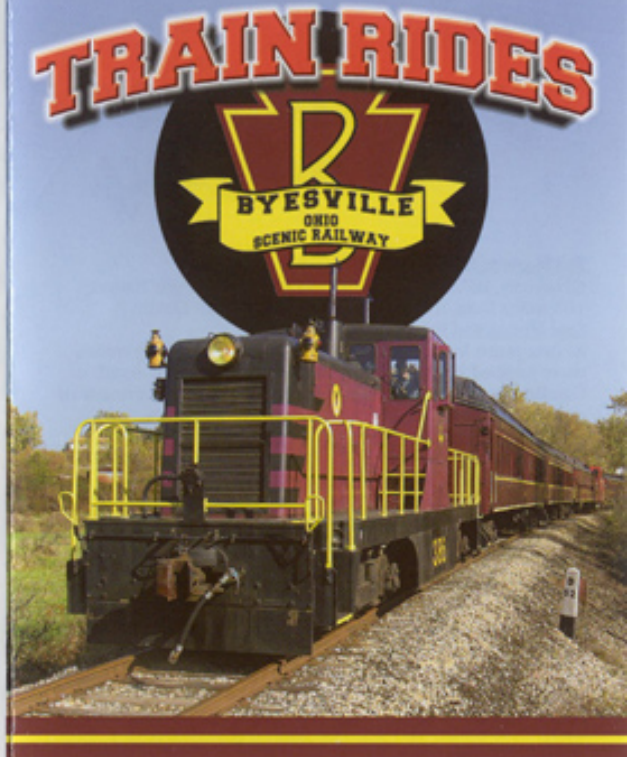

The Heart of Ohio's Coal Country

Climb aboard and enjoy our one, to one and one half hour round trip train excursion departing from Byesville. During your trip you will see the beautiful countryside of southeastern Ohio. On board you'll learn about the life, heritage, and culture of the coal miners that worked underground in the once many deep mines along the Marietta Branch of the Pennsylvania Railroad.

History of the Byesville Scenic Railway

The Marietta Branch of the Pennsylvania Railroad
Originally, 1871-1873, the "Marietta & Pittsburgh" Railway, 103 miles long, hauled coal from Marietta to Dover.

Coal Mining and the Marietta Branch

At one point in the early 1900's, over a dozen deep mines were located in over a three and a half mile route south of Cambridge. These mines generated hundreds of carloads of coal everyday and employed thousands of miners.

The Longest Straight Stretch on the Marietta Branch

A two and one half mile stretch in the 3.6 mile Byesville to Derwent section was the longest straight stretch on the Marietta Branch.

"N Cabin" or (C & M Crossing)

A crossing between the Marietta Branch and the B & O Railroad's "Eastern Ohio Branch", is situated halfway between Derwent and Pleasant City. A telegraph operator would hand up orders to trains crossing the "diamond". The B & O sometimes called it the Albin, after the family that owned the land prior to the railroads.

The Abandonment of the Marietta Branch 1976

In May 1976, the last train ran from Marietta to Dover. The only portion left was that east of Cambridge Union Station, south to N Cabin, and was considered part of B & O's "Eastern Ohio Branch."

B & O Trains Continue to Run 1976-1986

B & O Trains continued to haul carloads of ammonium nitrate for Central Ohio Coal from Cambridge to Cumberland. In the 1980's the track from south of Cambridge to N Cabin was rebuilt. Because of the new continuous welded rail you do not hear the clackety-clack of the wheels while riding.

The End of Rail Service to Cumberland 1986-1993

In 1986, regular rail service to Cumberland ended when bulk transfer silos were built at Woodlawn Ave. to store the ammonium nitrate. As the line became less important, maintenance of the track was deferred, and the line began to deteriorate. The last train to Cumberland via Byesville was a small diesel switcher engine for Muskingum Electric Railway in October 1993.

Train Returns to Byesville in 2003

The Buckeye Scenic Railroad excursion train arrived in Byesville just in time for the Jonathan Bye Days Festival 2003.

The Byesville Scenic Railway 2006

In June of 2006, the Byesville Scenic Railway resumed operations of the Byesville excursion train with its own locomotive. The mission of the Byesville Scenic Railway is to preserve, restore, maintain, and operate historic and vintage railway equipment, and to provide scenic train rides featuring a living history of the local coal mines. To promote, create, and maintain a railroad and coal mining museum and display site for the education and entertainment of the general public. To assist in the economic development of the area and to operate as a non-profit organization.

Update & Future for the Byesville Scenic Railway

We are working to reopen the remaining 6.5 miles of the old B&O Eastern Ohio Branch line from mile post 10 near Pleasant City southwest to Cumberland. This will extend our route to a 25 mile round trip. Upon your arrival in Cumberland you will be able to depart our excursion train to enjoy a WILDs Safari Tour Adventure.



- Byesville was the "Coal Mining Capital" of Guernsey County as there were 14 mines surrounding the town.
- More than 15,000 coal miners toiled in the Great Guernsey Valley.
- Seventy-seven (77) mines were served by the railroads.
- Coal seams averaged 5 to 6 feet thick.
- Guernsey County ranked 1st in Ohio coal production for many years.
- The Inter-Urban street car ran every 30 minutes due to the large number of miners who needed transportation to and from the mines for work.
- At times coal trains loaded full of "buried sunshine" or rocks that burn* departed for the Great Lakes area every 20 minutes.
- 100 years later almost all evidence of the mines has been crased.
